THE BEST WORLD CUP ATMOSPHERE IS IN MEXICO CITY

Mexico City holds a unique place in the history of world soccer. No other city has hosted four World Cups: it did so in 1970, in the historic 1971 Women's World Cup, in 1986, and will do so again in 2026. Here, soccer is part of everyday life; it's played in stadiums, but also in the streets, in neighborhoods, in schools, and in the collective memory of millions of people. That's why, when the ball starts rolling again in this capital, the World Cup atmosphere will be felt in every corner of the city.

During June and July 2026, beyond the excitement in the stadium, the city itself will be a protagonist. The Mexican capital will open its doors to the world with a celebration that will unite sport, culture, entertainment, and community life. Mexico City will arrive at this World Cup with experience, modern infrastructure, renewed mobility, and an internationally recognized cultural identity. 700 years after its founding, the city is preparing to welcome millions of visitors with hospitality, diversity, and an energy that makes it one of the most vibrant destinations on the planet. The World Cup festivities will take place in all 16 boroughs. There are more than 160 World Cup events for everyone. There will be 18 Football Festivals with free broadcasts of matches and activities for the whole family; the Official FIFA Fan Festival in the Zócalo, in addition to vibrant activities in parks, public squares, indigenous communities, and other community spaces.

The cultural menu will accompany every moment of the tournament. More than 25 exhibitions related to soccer, art, and Mexican identity will coexist with concerts, shows, and large-scale events in iconic venues such as the National Auditorium, Campo Marte, and the GNP Stadium. The main streets and avenues will host parades, special activities, and community gatherings, transforming the capital into a vast space for community and collective celebration.

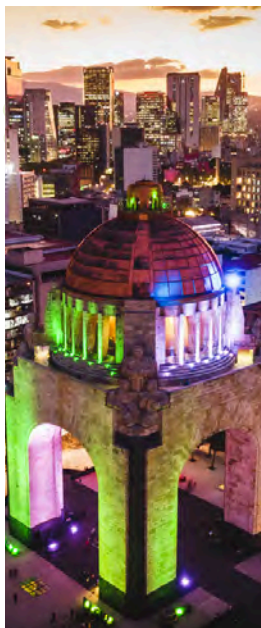

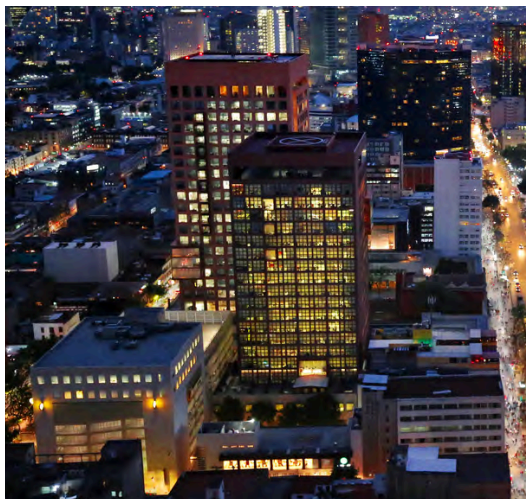

THE FIFA WORLD CUP TROPHY

The "FIFA World Cup Champions Trophy" stands out both for its symbolic value and for its unique physical and design attributes. It weighs almost 15 pounds, stands nearly 15 inches tall, and has a diameter of almost 5 inches. These dimensions make it a compact yet visually striking trophy. It is crafted from a copper and zinc alloy coated in gold, giving it its distinctive golden finish.

Its production is entirely artisanal, handcrafted in Italy by expert goldsmiths in workshops such as Bertoni, located in Milan. The trophy's design features two human figures holding the planet, an element that symbolizes the universality of soccer and global unity through the sport.

FESTIVALS


Beyond the stadium walls, the Mexico City government has promoted 18 completely free soccer festivals and 14 privately produced ones, strategically distributed throughout the 16 boroughs to ensure that the FIFA 2026 World Cup can be celebrated throughout the capital. Designed under strict safety protocols and with a family-friendly approach, these festivals go beyond simply showing matches.

Visitors will find giant high-definition screens, community tournaments of classic 'cascarita' soccer games, and each venue will serve as a showcase for local cuisine, offering everything from traditional snacks to relaxation areas. Seven of these large festivals will be active throughout the 39 days of the Cup (broadcasting all 104 matches), while the remaining ones will be activated on key dates to show the most crucial matches and, of course, all the games of the Mexican National Team.

CULTURAL CORRIDOR

Mexico City boasts the second largest museum network in the world and will present a FIFA 2026 World Cup-themed cultural corridor for art and soccer lovers. The World Cup cultural corridor is an aesthetic and reflective program that explores the sport from diverse perspectives such as pre-Hispanic archaeology, sustainable fashion, contemporary art, biomechanics, and industrial design. Through these 24 venues and open galleries, the capital demonstrates that sport and culture share the same passion.

FOOTBALL DESIGNING A PASSION | FRANZ MAYER MUSEUM

Mexico's leading venue for design and decorative arts presents a monumental exhibition curated by expert Kevin Moore. The show brings together more than 250 historical pieces in collaboration with England's National Football Museum. It explores how design has shaped the identity and collective memory of the World Cups. Visitors can admire the graphic evolution of posters and tickets since Uruguay 1930, models of the avant-garde architecture of modern stadiums, and the engineering behind the ball. The crown jewel is the display of original shoes and uniforms worn on the field by Pelé, Maradona, Hugo Sánchez, Messi, and Cristiano Ronaldo.



FAIR PLAY: THE FIELD THAT UNITES US | MUSEUM OF MEMORY AND TOLERANCE

This exhibition intertwines sport with human rights. Comprised of eight immersive rooms and over 120 video and virtual reality testimonies, the exhibit addresses soccer as a tool for social cohesion and peace, narrating documented stories of how the sport has helped stop civil wars, such as in Ivory Coast, promoting the inclusion of refugees and actively combating racism and homophobia. At the same time, it raises awareness about the ethical challenges of the industry, such as labor exploitation and trafficking.

FOOTBALL AND ART, THAT SAME EMOTION | JUMEX MUSEUM

The imposing building designed by David Copperfield in Polanco houses a refined collection of international contemporary art. Curated by Guillermo Santamarina, this exhibition consists of 45 large-format works including sculptures, video art, and sound installations by global artists. It uses the visual aesthetics of the stadium and the overflowing passion of soccer fandom as a canvas to question profound subjects such as national identity, gender barriers, mass consumption, and globalization.



EPIC ALBUM | YANCUIC MUSEUM

Nestled in Iztapalapa, this venue exhibits the largest collection of football memorabilia ever gathered, with more than 15,000 authenticated historical pieces. It is the authentic "holy grail" for collectors. Its galleries boast official jerseys, still bearing traces of dirt and sweat, worn by legends from 90 national teams in the most iconic finals in history. It features 5 interactive hologram areas to simulate a "Team Messi vs Ronaldo" and provides a physical album to attendees to collect exclusive stickers in each room.

MEXICO HERE | MONUMENT TO MOTHERS

An immense 21 thousand square feet open-air multisensory pavilion in the heart of the Reforma-Insurgentes corridor designed to celebrate Mexican identity and its legendary hospitality is divided into six immersive themed rooms: Stone, Light, Music, Rites, 'Masa' and Ball. It combines architectural projections, regional gastronomic tasting areas, and mega screens surrounded by green areas so that visitors can have a good time in a cultural environment.



LEONORA CARRINGTON. LABYRINTH | CAI – IMMERSIVE ARTS CENTER

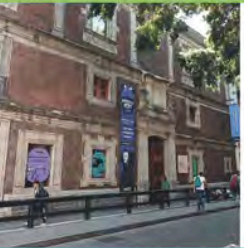
Taking advantage of the flow of international tourism, Mexico City pays homage to one of its most beloved artists. This 360-degree multimedia immersion covers more than 16 thousand square feet of laser projection using state-of-the-art digital mapping and surround sound design. The visitor literally walks inside the 40 digitized paintings, interacting with the Celtic symbols of Carrington's surreal dream creatures, all accompanied by 15 physical monumental sculptures by the artist.



THE CITY OF THREE WORLD CUPS | AGORA, PEOPLE'S GALLERY

Located in the Old City Hall in the Zócalo, this exhibition offers a deeply nostalgic journey through 120 restored vintage photographs and 45 period newspaper front pages. It visually documents how Mexico City society dressed, celebrated, and vibrated during the World Cups that took place in Mexico 1970 and 1986, highlighting the city's rapid urban transformation.



PASS THE BALL | INTERACTIVE MUSEUM OF ECONOMICS (MIDE)

Created in an unprecedented partnership with the Perot Museum of Nature and Science in Dallas, this exhibit features 15 high-tech stations that allow children and adults to understand the complex economic, social, and technological impact of modern soccer through participatory modules, real-time data visualization screens, and biomechanical simulators. It explains everything from how the multi-million-dollar transfer market works to the global economic impact generated by the sport.

WHAT COLOR DOES GREEN PAINT? | NATIONAL COLLEGE

Mexico's highest academic and intellectual institution organizes this profound analytical retrospective made up of 50 archival documents and a series of 12 master round tables. The objective is to unravel, together with literary thinkers and sociologists, the anthropological meaning of the color of the field, the cultural representation of the Mexican national team in the eyes of the world, and the complex mass psychology behind the cry of "goal!"



A BALL IS BORN | ZAPATA METRO STATION

In an extraordinary direct collaboration with the National Institute of Anthropology and History (INAH). The underground corridors of Metro Line 12 are transformed into a high-traffic archaeological museum. On display under strict conservation controls are three original raw rubber balls, over 3,600 years old, discovered at the sacred site of El Manatí, Veracruz. Accompanied by 10 informative dioramas, they trace the astonishing lineage from the ancient and sacred Mesoamerican rite to the current era.

SCIENCE IS ON THE FIELD | UNIVERSUM

The impressive UNAM Science Museum offers 20 laboratories and interactive challenges on physics, biology, and technology applied to soccer. Through sensory experiences such as a miniature wind tunnel, visitors discover the exact aerodynamics behind the effect of a swerve, the secrets of high-performance nutrition for elite athletes, how VAR technology works, and includes spaces dedicated to technological innovation in adapted soccer.





FOLK ART AND FOOTBALL | ITURBIDE PALACE

With this exhibition, Banamex Cultural Foundation transforms the courtyards of this 18th-century architectural gem in the historic center by displaying 150 previously unseen masterpieces, winners of the 'Popular Art Cup.' Visitors will marvel at works in black clay, carved wood, lacquer, and fine textiles, where great master artisans from all over the country reinterpret the iconography, teams, and history of soccer exclusively from the perspective of the indigenous peoples.

ROUND GODDESS ANTHROPO-TEXTILES | MUSEUM OF MEXICO CITY

The artist Gabriela González Leal intervenes in the rooms of this Viceroyal Palace to exhibit 12 monumental textile installations created from recycled sports uniform t-shirts. TIME TUNNEL: THE TRANSFORMATION OF THE CITY | ZÓCALO-PINO SUÁREZ PASSAGE

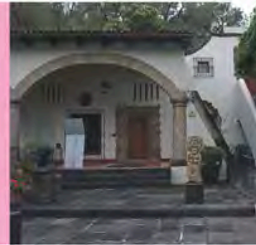

The exhibition, featuring dozens of hours of previously unseen audiovisual material, celebrates the heroic and historic 1971 Women's World Cup, which filled the Azteca Stadium.

THE CITY THAT NEVER STOPPED PLAYING | CISS, SAN JERÓNIMO

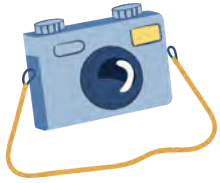
THE 100 MUST-SEE ATTRACTIONS IN MEXICO CITY



Exploring Mexico City is traveling through centuries of living history in a single territory. Considered one of the most fascinating and vibrant metropolises in the world, the Mexican capital is an immense urban canvas where the pre-Hispanic past and viceregal architecture harmoniously intertwine with contemporary dynamism and avant-garde design. It is an inexhaustible city, built on the bed of an ancient lake, which defies time and captivates the senses of those who wander through it.

Embracing the immensity of this cultural, architectural, and social melting pot led us to select the favorite destinations in Mexico City. More than a simple inventory, this document is a compass designed to immerse the visitor in the soul of the capital through eight strategic routes. Each circuit has been mapped out to unveil the secrets, monuments, aromas, and landscapes that define the unique character of the metropolis.

The foundational journey begins in the Historic Center, a polygon declared a World Heritage Site that concentrates the political and spiritual power, as well as the heritage of the Mexica empire, guiding our steps from the awe of the Templo Mayor to the refinement of the Palacio de Bellas Artes. The monumentality continues along the Chapultepec and Paseo de la Reforma corridor, an oasis where the largest urban green lung in the Americas shelters the only royal castle on the continent, framed by an avenue of European elegance and avant-garde skyscrapers.



THE 100 MUST-SEE

ATTRACTIONS IN MEXICO CITY

Towards the south, the city reveals its most bohemian, nostalgic, and folkloric facet. The Coyoacán and Xochimilco block invites you to delve into intellectual refuges—such as the iconic universe of Frida Kahlo—and to navigate the ancient chinampa canals that keep the lacustrine memory alive. Nearby, San Ángel and its surroundings offer a haven of cobblestone streets, art plazas, and Carmelite enclosures that bear witness to the placid life of the ancient original neighborhoods.

Contrasting with the quietude of the south and the weight of the center, the Modern Neighborhoods (Roma, Condesa, and Polanco) showcase the city's most cosmopolitan face. This is the territory of design, art deco architecture, luxury, and a vibrant urban life on a pedestrian scale.

Regarding the region's profound spiritual duality, the Religious and Archaeological Sites route embarks on a millennial journey connecting the monumental pyramids of Teotihuacán and Cuicuilco with the immense fervor of Guadalupan devotion.

Simultaneously, the soul of the city is served at the table through the Markets and Gastronomy block, a sensory experience that celebrates the cultural blending at the Central de Abasto, the resilience of centennial pulquerías, and the eternal feast of Plaza Garibaldi.

Finally, the metropolis proves that it never ceases to amaze in its Unique and Family Experiences, a playful finale designed to thrill with sports adrenaline at the "Colossus of Santa Úrsula," lucha libre, enjoying the urban landscape on the Turibús, or marveling at interactive complexes and world-class venues.

HISTORIC CENTER

(21 places)

Declared a Cultural World Heritage Site by UNESCO, the vibrant polygon is an immense living museum that condenses over seven centuries of history in its streets, squares, and facades. Walking through its cobblestone corridors is embarking on a tangible journey through time: here, the ancient foundations of the Mexica empire coexist with the majesty of viceregal baroque, the elegance of 19th-century palaces, and the first marvels of 20th-century modernity. Delving into this political, spiritual, and cultural epicenter allows you to discover firsthand the monumental art, legends, and inexhaustible energy of a metropolis built on lacustrine terrain.

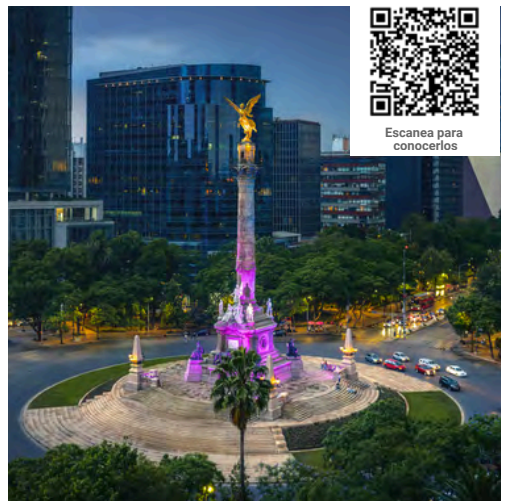
CHAPULTEPEC AND PASEO DE LA REFORMA

(15 places)

The route along this axis is, without a doubt, the most elegant and emblematic in the city. Conceived as a nexus between the ancient refuge of the tlatoanis and the epicenter of urban development, this vast expanse displays the capital's natural and architectural diversity like no other. Through its imposing museums, lakes, roundabouts, and monuments, the visitor follows a guiding thread connecting ancestral roots with contemporary sophistication. Exploring this corridor is to enter an oasis where art, nature, history, and modernity converse to reveal the dynamism of Mexico City.

COYOACÁN AND XOCHIMILCO

(16 places)

The south of the capital guards an exceptional historical and scenic wealth, defined by the heritage of its original towns and the splendor of its viceregal neighborhoods. Coyoacán and Xochimilco stand as the great custodians of the cultural and natural memory of the metropolis. On this tour, the visitor transitions from the millennial chinampa canals—a World Heritage Site—and the imposing volcanic rock of the Pedregal, to the cobblestone squares that served as a creative refuge for the most brilliant minds of 20th-century art and literature. It is a fascinating journey into the bohemian, lacustrine, and traditional soul that still beats strongly within the urban environment.



Modern Neighborhoods

ROMA, CONDESA AND POLANCO

(12 places)

The urban transformation of the 20th century left the capital a series of districts that today define its most cosmopolitan and avant-garde face. The Roma, Condesa, and Polanco neighborhoods form an unavoidable circuit where architectural heritage continuously converses with contemporary design, signature gastronomy, and cultural innovation. These neighborhoods invite an exploration on a pedestrian scale, discovering among their medians, parks, and art deco or neocolonial style squares a style of nightlife and vibrant living of the Mexican capital.



SAN ÁNGEL AND ITS SURROUNDINGS

(6 places)

Characterized by its artistic vocation and impeccable heritage preservation, San Ángel is a cobblestone oasis that captivates the senses. From the ancient Carmelite cloisters and small squares loaded with historical memory to the iconic workshops where modern national art was born, this block exposes the fascinating visual transition from New Spanish Mexico to 20th-century functionalism. Exploring this circuit allows the visitor to transit between imposing monuments, open-air galleries, and top-tier scenic spaces.



RELIGIOUS AND ARCHAEOLOGICAL SITES

(8 places)

The metropolis and its surroundings sit upon a deep stratigraphy of beliefs, cosmovisions, and civilizations. This block reveals the intense spiritual duality that forged the capital's identity. On the one hand, ancient pyramids and ceremonial centers testify to the immense urban greatness of the original peoples and their unwavering cosmology. On the other, majestic Marian sanctuaries, ascetic retreat convents, and cloisters of intellectual splendor narrate the history of sacred art. Exploring this set of sites is embarking on a journey through millennia, where pre-Hispanic volcanic stone and the baroque period converge to tell the story of faith in the Valley of Mexico.



MARKETS AND GASTRONOMY

(9 places)

The capital's culinary and commercial wealth is the living reflection of a cultural blending that has been cooking for centuries. This tour offers a direct immersion into the aromas, colors, and textures that define the identity of the metropolis. From the monumental scale of the continent's main supply center to the nostalgic elegance of centennial cafes and the revelry of its musical plazas, these venues are not just consumption sites but true guardians of intangible heritage. Exploring these markets, taverns, and restaurants means savoring history, understanding the dynamics of their neighborhoods, and celebrating the inexhaustible creativity of Mexican cuisine.

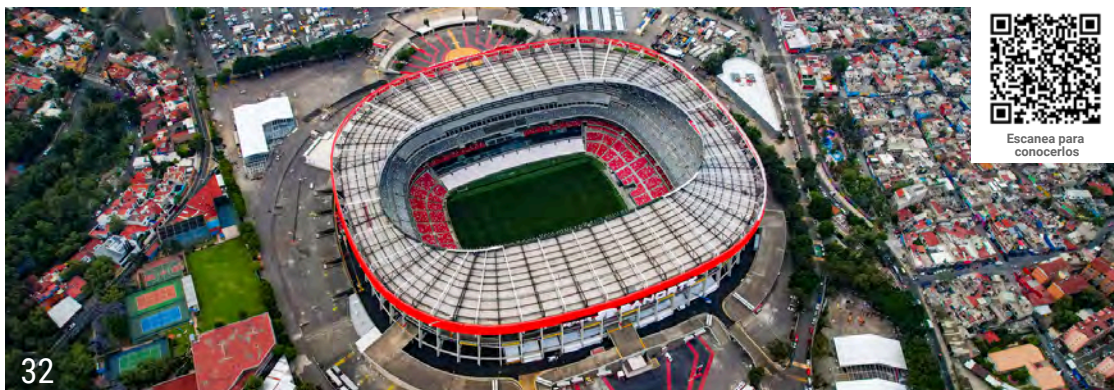

MEXICO CITY 2026: ROUTES WITH A WORLD CUP HEART



Mexico City is getting ready to make history by hosting its third FIFA World Cup in 2026. To welcome millions of fans, the capital's government has implemented the Local Tourism Development Plan, a major urban transformation materialized in the "CDMX Tourism Corridors 2024-2030" project, or rather, "Heart Routes" (Rutas de Corazón). Here, the city has comprehensively renewed its most important connectivity axes, mapping out areas of high interest that will guide visitors through the capital's wonders: the Historic Center-Villa de Guadalupe Corridor, the attractive Chapultepec-Zona Rosa Corridor, the strategic South Corridor-Mexico City Stadium, and the beautiful Xochimilco Corridor.

These routes have undergone an immediate urban rehabilitation action program. Visitor mobility and safety have been prioritized through the installation of safe pedestrian crossings, new tourism signage, clear street naming, and modern information kiosks. The urban environment has been beautified through the maintenance of sidewalks, lighting, and green areas, in addition to integrating tactical infrastructure such as totems, bicycle racks, public restrooms, and exclusive stops for tourist transportation. With these interventions, the corridors are consolidated as orderly and accessible spaces befitting a global metropolis.

Beyond the sports adrenaline, the capital will dazzle with the "Host City Mexico City" cultural program, merging art and soccer in an unprecedented circuit. Through seven wonderful, carefully designed routes, tourists will be able to explore 19 thematic exhibitions distributed across 17 of the capital's most beloved museums. This corridor includes globally renowned venues such as the National Museum of Anthropology, the Franz Mayer Museum, the Jumex Museum, the Tamayo Museum, and the Galería del Pueblo.

For those seeking to immerse themselves in the millenary and picturesque essence of Mexico City, the "Classic Program" offers unmissable tourist experiences. This offering ranges from peaceful boat rides at the Cuemanco pier in Xochimilco and visits to the innovative Utopía Libertad, to combined excursions to the pyramids of Teotihuacan and the Basilica of Guadalupe, complemented by nighttime Video Mapping shows aboard the Capital Bus in the heart of the Historic Center.

Showcasing its most inclusive and avant-garde face, the "Mexico City Experiences" program invites visitors to discover the city's contemporary and community wonders. Highlights include the "Hold Me Closer" route, which tours the impressive monumental urban murals from the Cablebús, and the "Haitian Community" route, a unique experience to enjoy the World Cup matches from the immense Central de Abasto, topped off with a tour of the world's largest photovoltaic solar plant installed on the roofs of a public market.

This World Cup experience in Mexico City will be a grand celebration of diversity, culture, and global human fraternity. The agenda intertwines major soccer festivals in the boroughs, massive concerts, and the loving LGBT+ Pride Parade in the City with a Big Heart (Ciudad de Corazón Grande), ready to embrace the entire world in an unforgettable party where the entire Mexican capital becomes a pitch... Pass the ball, please!



MEXICO CITY TOURIST CORRIDORS

A FUTURISTIC VISION

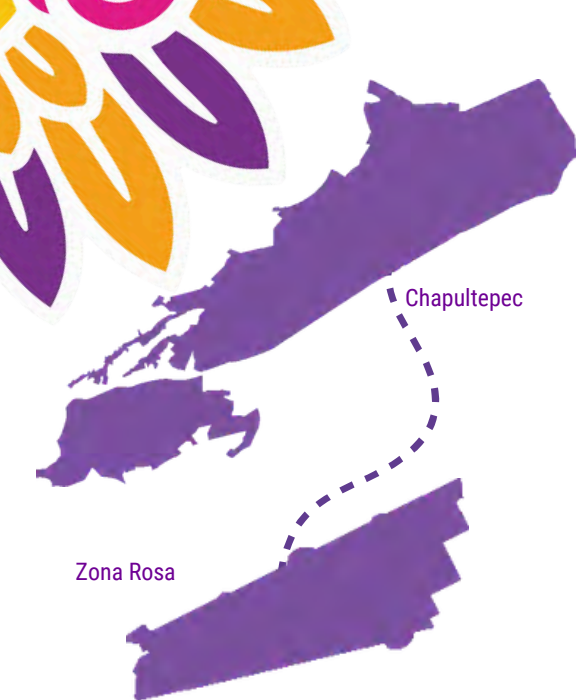
The nation's capital is transforming to welcome the world without losing sight of the people who move through it every day. Within this vision, the Mexico City Corridors project has been under development since 2024, with a completion horizon set for 2030. It is a strategy that supports the city's preparation for the World Cup, while going far beyond the scope of this major event. The initiative is designed to organize, connect, and enrich some of the metropolis' most emblematic routes, making the experience of walking through, visiting, and living in the city increasingly comfortable, safe, and memorable.

Four corridors shape this proposal: the **Historic Center-Basilica of Guadalupe Corridor**, linking two of the city's most representative spaces of memory, faith, and identity; the **Chapultepec-Zona Rosa Corridor**, where cultural energy, the urban forest, and cosmopolitan life coexist; the **Southern Corridor: Mexico City Stadium**, conceived as a strategic route surrounding one of the city's major venues for sports and collective gatherings; and the **Xochimilco Corridor**, which highlights one of the capital's most beloved and unique landscapes, rich in environmental, historical, and community heritage. Together, they portray a diverse and open city.

Beyond the map itself, these corridors are being equipped with infrastructure that will tangibly improve both the tourist and urban experience. All of them will feature safe crossings, proximity to tourist transportation stops, parking areas, and restroom facilities, as well as tourist information modules that will make it easier for visitors to navigate the city.

Because a capital becomes truly memorable when it welcomes its visitors warmly and improves the everyday lives of its people; when it invites people to walk at ease, to pause, to look with fresh eyes, and to reconnect with neighborhoods, avenues, plazas, temples, parks, and canals that are part of a living history.

BE PART OF THE TEAM

DESIGN, TECHNOLOGY, AND SYMBOLISM IN EL TRI'S UNIFORM

The team trained by Javier Aguirre will return to its traditional green color at the FIFA 2026 World Cup. The Mexican National Team is scheduled to debut on June 11 at Mexico City Stadium in the opening match, sporting the iconic green jersey.

The new Mexican National Team jersey maintains the manufacturer's traditional three stripes on the shoulders and features a holographic crest. A figure reminiscent of the 'Sun Stone' -as seen at the National Anthropology Museum in México City-, stands out in the center of the jersey, a nod to the design used in the 1998 World Cup.

The images used on the shirt constitute an authorized reproduction by the National Institute of Anthropology and History (INAH), whose certification guarantees that the cultural elements included in the garment are used legally, respecting the rights of Mexican cultural heritage and the country's intellectual and cultural property laws.

The Mexican National Team players will also wear their 'visitor' jersey for the FIFA 2026 World Cup, a white garment with gray geometric patterns and the phrase "Somos México" (We Are Mexico) on the back of the neck. The design emphasizes national identity and technological innovation. Inspired by traditional Mexican architecture, history, and art, the geometric patterns evoke decorations on ancient pyramids and colonial buildings, translating that visual language to the playing field.

The jersey is part of the Adidas Trifolio collection, a line that revives motifs and cuts characteristic of the 1990s. The design symbolizes the flow of soccer, from the initial kickoff and movement through midfield to the final goal, serving as a visual metaphor for the rhythm, intensity, and precision of the Mexican style of play. Furthermore, the phrase "Somos México", embroidered on the back of the neck, encapsulates the unity and passion of the fans. On a technical level, the jersey incorporates Climacool+ technology, designed to optimize ventilation and keep players cool and dry during competition. Without a doubt, the official uniforms of El Tricolor will be an armor to face any rival.



TRIONDA

*Emblem of the greatest
tournament in soccer
history*

The Telstar, considered the godfather of all footballs, made its debut in 1970 during the first soccer World Cup held in Mexico. This ball was created by Adidas with the intention of standing out on television (mostly black and white at the time) thanks to its iconic design of black and white pentagons and hexagons, becoming the first official ball designed by the brand for a World Cup.

Four years later, in Germany, the Telstar Durlas was presented, an improved version of the original Telstar, which incorporated a coating to increase water resistance. At the World Cup in Argentina, the Tango was introduced, whose design featured twelve circles around each pentagon, adding elegance and greater durability to the ball.

For Spain 1982, the Tango evolved, becoming the last ball made of leather and the first to display the Adidas trefoil logo. The brand consolidated its position as a pioneer in sports innovation by improving water resistance using rubber in the seams.

In Mexico 1986, we all sang: **the world united by a ball.** The Azteca marked a milestone as the first fully synthetic, efficient, and water-resistant ball, with a design inspired by Aztec culture. This model started the trend of representing the host country's aesthetic in the official match balls.

Following the Azteca, other iconic models emerged: the Etrusco in Italy 1990; Questa in the United States 1994; Tricolore in France 1998; Fevertova in Korea-Japan 2002; Teamgeist in Germany 2006; Jubulani in South Africa 2010; Brazuca in Brazil 2014; Telstar 18 in Russia 2018; and Al Rihla in Qatar 2022.





For the 2026 FIFA World Cup, the Trionda ball was unveiled, notable for its stability, power, and precision. Its design incorporates three waves: red for Canada, blue for the United States, and green for Mexico, symbolizing the historical union of the three host nations. The golden sparkles allude to soccer's most prestigious trophy, highlighting the importance of the event.

The Trionda's structure consists of four seamlessly joined panels, providing a more stable surface and improving flight and shot accuracy. The panels represent the waves that give the ball its name and form a central triangle, a symbol of the collaboration between the three countries.

The ball's body features icons representing the host countries: maple leaves, stars, and golden eagles, which also contribute to improved grip in wet conditions. The Trionda stands out not only for its design but also for the technology it incorporates. It is equipped with a state-of-the-art sensor capable of registering up to 500 movements per second. The data is transmitted in real time to the video assistant referee (VAR) system, facilitating decision-making in controversial plays such as offsides.

Mexico is ready for the ball to roll. There will be five emblematic matches in the nation's capital: June 11, opening match Mexico vs. South Africa; June 24, Mexico vs. Czech Republic; June 30, first-place finisher from Group A (could be Mexico) vs. best third-place finisher from Groups C, E, F, H, or I; and July 5, winner of match 79 (could be Mexico) vs. winner of match 80 (round of 16).

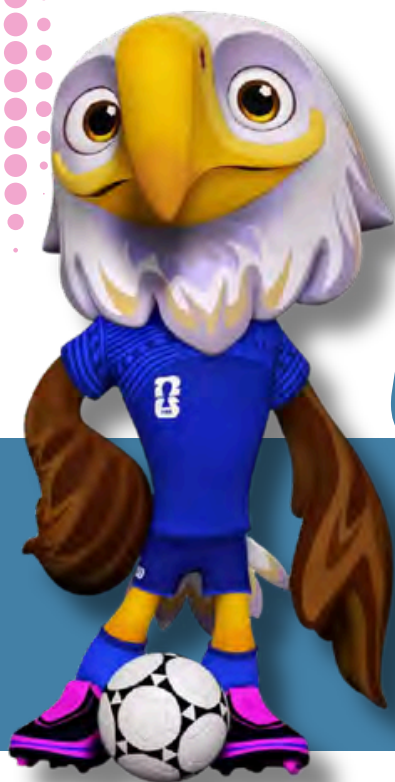

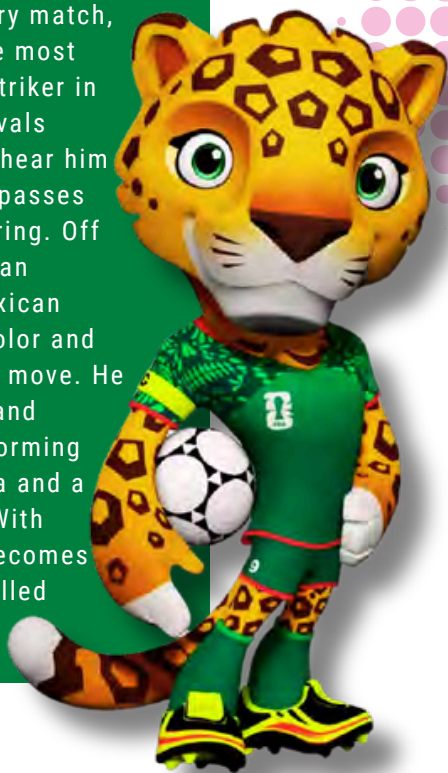

CHILDREN IN MEXICO CITY PLAYED IN THE WORLD CUP



The Ollamaliztli (*ball game, in Nahuatl*) Community Children's Soccer Tournament brought together 7,648 children from all 16 boroughs of Mexico City. It culminated in a grand final held at the Magdalena Mixhuca *Utopía*.

The tournament's main objective was achieved: to transform the event into a true community celebration, promoting health, inclusion, and social inclusion among the children involved.

As part of the activities leading up to the FIFA 2026 World Cup, the Mexico City Government, along with the cities Ministry of Tourism, the Sports Institute, and the Pilares Community Education Subsystem, organized the Ollamaliztli Community Children's Soccer Tournament. This tournament invited children and teenagers from all boroughs to participate, with the aim of fostering a culture of peace through sports. That's why UNICEF, through its 'Fair Play' campaign, and UNHCR (United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees), with its 'Goals for Inclusion' initiative, joined this effort. More than 120 migrant, refugee, and local children and teenagers participated in soccer matches to promote coexistence, social cohesion, and inclusion.

For the tournament, local parks and sports facilities became spaces of belonging, regardless of the participants' ages. The teams got to know each other and understood that soccer is a sport that transcends packed stadiums, integrating diverse sectors of the metropolis in places that were previously empty.





After 1,952 matches were played, the tournament, promoted by the Mexico City government, concluded with a victory for **Zaporo City** team, who defeated Villarreal 2-1 in the women's final. The players from the Tláhuac borough, wearing green and black jerseys and accompanied by numerous residents in the stands of the Magdalena Mixhuca Utopía lifted the trophy. The award was presented by Mexico City Mayor, Clara Brugada, and allowed the group of 80 champions to attend the Mexico-Portugal match on March 28, during the reopening of the Azteca Stadium (now Mexico City Stadium).

This tournament, considered the largest community children's tournament in the history of Mexico City, brought together more than 800 teams and was played on approximately 200 fields distributed throughout the city. Nearly 2,000 matches were played, in which 6,303 goals were scored. Boys and girls from all over the capital shared the field, the ball, and a common dream: to play soccer and build community.



RENOVATED SOCCER FIELDS

The World Cup lights will go out in July, but the impact of this tournament will last for generations. The Mexico City government launched a program for the complete renovation of 316 sports fields and neighborhood sports complexes in various parts of the city. This effort aims to steer young people away from violence, promote public health, and encourage sports.

The Mexico City government brought the excitement of the World Cup to the neighborhoods where the enthusiasm for renovation spread to residents who quickly became volunteers and collaborated on the project. The initiative seeks to promote sports, community engagement, and local talent. These spaces include options for soccer, futsal, and multi-purpose courts, with at least one in each borough of the capital.

The goal is to host the international event and leave a lasting sporting legacy for millions of Mexico City residents. We are arriving at the World Cup with a transformed city, with projects that not only respond to the event but also become permanent benefits for the community.



THE MEXICAN WAVE



A GLOBAL SYMBOL

Getting ready for the 2026 FIFA World Cup, Mexico City launched a campaign to set the Guinness World Record for the longest wave in the world. The exercise could not have had a better setting: Paseo de la Reforma. This past May 31st, hundreds of people gathered in an exercise of fraternity, sportsmanship, and great fun.

The wave or “Mexican Wave”; as it is known in various parts of the world, has become one of the most emblematic activities performed by fans in sports stadiums. It happens when a group of spectators stand up, raise their arms, and sit back down in a synchronized manner, following a pattern that travels through the stadium and creates a visual effect like that of a wave.

Most people identify the wave with the 1986 FIFA World Cup, when thousands of attendees coordinated to perform this movement, which became popular thanks to media attention. Although similar practices had previously occurred in other sports, it was in that tournament where the wave acquired international fame.

However, according to FIFA, the first recognized wave took place on October 15, 1981, during a baseball game between the Oakland Athletics and the New York Yankees. The movement was invented in the United States, before being universalized by the Mexican public during the 1986 FIFA World Cup.

In fact, the first proven record in Mexico was in a friendly match between Mexico and Argentina on September 18, 1984, where 55,000 spectators sustained the movement for several minutes at the Tecnológico de Monterrey Stadium.

During the 1986 FIFA World Cup in Mexico, the wave was performed in the opening match between Italy and Bulgaria and was repeated throughout the rest of the tournament, regardless of whether the Mexican national team was playing. Thus, a sports classic was born, introduced to the world by Mexicans.

In Australia, the wave is performed counterclockwise and is banned in cricket. In Hungary, scientific studies determined that the wave advances 40 feet or 22 seats per second. Finland obtained a Guinness World Record with 31 laps around a stadium, while in the United States, another mark was achieved with a wave of 168,000 people during a NASCAR race.

The wave on Paseo de la Reforma celebrated diversity in every sense, something only this city can achieve. The event brought together hundreds of people in complete freedom: dancers, marathon runners, artists, anime fans, grandparents, designers, *pachucos*, *marichis*, the LGBTQ+ community, police officers, electricians, taxi drivers, people with disabilities, and countless others.

Besides breaking the Guinness World Record, it was demonstrated that the most important aspect of the Mexican Wave is that it can only be done when people work together in harmony. Regardless of the team you support or the stadium where the wave is performed, it's an exercise in soccer passion that shows the most fun part of the sport is enjoying it together.

JUNE PRIDE MONTH

All Forms of Love are Welcomed in Mexico City

In Mexico City, **Pride march** is a cry for freedom and respect. Here, diversity is celebrated without discrimination or homophobia: everyone is welcome, and every identity has its place. **Long live equality!**

June, Pride Month, focuses on the concept of equality and recognizes the work of people in the *LGBTQ+* community, education about *LGBTQ+* history, and awareness of the issues affecting the *LGBTQ+* community. It also invites us to remember the harm that homophobia caused and, sadly, continues to cause.

June 28th is International LGBTQ+ Pride Day, an emblematic date on which groups from around the world unite to highlight diversity and demand equal rights for all people, regardless of their sexual orientation or gender identity. The essential concept of Pride lies in the idea that all people should feel proud of who they are.

Why LGBTQ+? Naming identities is essential to protect people of diverse sexual orientations or gender identities and prevent discrimination or violence. The **"L"** refers to lesbians, women who are attracted to other women. The **"G"** represents gay men, who are attracted to other men. The term 'gay' of English origin is widely accepted to describe gay men and is sometimes used to refer to the entire *LGBTQ+* community.

The **"B"** refers to bisexual people, who can be attracted to people of the same sex or a different sex. The **"T"** includes trans or transgender people, whose gender identity and/or expression does not align with the conventional expectations associated with the sex assigned at birth.

The **"I"** represents intersex people, who are born with biological characteristics that do not fit into the typical categories of male or female. The **"Q"** stands for 'queer' and encompasses people who identify beyond traditional categories, such as the gender binary or heterosexuality/homosexuality.

The **"+"** symbol was added to include groups not represented in the previous acronyms, such as *gender fluid*, *non-binary people*, and other orientations like *pansexuality*, *asexuality*, or *demisexuality*. Thus, an inclusive space is sought for all people.

This **June 27th**, a Pride march will be held alongside the FIFA 2026 World Cup activities in an atmosphere of respect, peace, and great excitement. This year, seven colors will illuminate the sky of the capital from the Monument to the Revolution to the Zócalo. On June 19, Yvette Mattern's *'Global Rainbow'* will cover the streets of the Historic Center with multicolored lights.

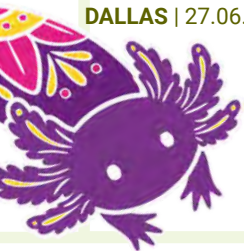

TOURIST ASSISTANCE GUIDE

1. Banking and Financial Services

1. How can I withdraw cash if my card is from another country?

- You can use ATMs; most of them accept international Visa and Mastercard cards. The screen will show you the exchange rate and the applicable commission before confirming the transaction.

2. Where can I exchange my dollars or other currencies for pesos?

- For a quick cash exchange, we recommend visiting the currency exchange offices located at the airport or in tourist areas (such as Reforma or Polanco).

3. How can I find out the daily exchange rate?

- You can check it directly on ATM screens, at bank branch windows, or on the internet.

4. What should I do if I lost my card or the ATM retained it?

- Report it immediately to your bank's customer service number, or block it directly from your bank's mobile app.

5. What are the most accepted payment methods in the City?

- The vast majority of restaurants, hotels, and shops accept credit and debit cards. However, we suggest always carrying some cash (Mexican pesos) for traditional markets, tips, or small businesses..

6. How can I use the Metro or Metrobús?

- You need to buy an "Integrated Mobility Card" (Tarjeta de Movilidad Integrada). You can purchase and recharge it at the vending machines located at the entrance of any Metro or Metrobús station.

7. Where can I take a safe taxi?

- Through ride-hailing apps (Uber, DiDi) or by requesting a "Taxi de Sitio", which have authorized fixed bases outside shopping malls and subway stations. If you decide to hail a taxi on the street, make sure it is an official city taxi: they are painted pink and white, have the "CDMX" logo on the doors, the license plate number must be painted on the sides and on the hood, and the driver must visibly display their photo ID badge (tarjetón).

8. What is the fastest way to get to the airport?

- The most comfortable option is to request a ride via an app, but if you prefer public transportation, Metrobús Line 4 has a direct service to both airport terminals.

9. Is there safe public transportation in the early morning hours?

- The Metro operates until midnight. After that time, the safest option is to use private transportation or ride-hailing apps (Uber, DiDi).

10. How can I connect to the Internet?

- The city offers the free "WiFi CDMX" network in public parks and security poles. For a constant mobile connection, we suggest buying a prepaid SIM card or the "Internet para el Bienestar" chip.

11. Where do I buy a SIM card or chip for my phone?

- You can purchase commercial SIM cards at any Oxxo or 7-Eleven store. If you are specifically looking for the "Internet para el Bienestar" chip, you can buy it at Financiera para el Bienestar (FINABIEN) branches or at Correos de México (Mexican Postal Service) offices.

16. What is the emergency number in Mexico?

- Dial 911 from any phone to contact the police, firefighters, or ambulance services.

17. Is it safe to drink tap water?

- It is not recommended; it is always better to consume bottled water, which you can buy at any store or pharmacy.

18. Is it mandatory to leave a tip in restaurants?

- It is not mandatory, but the local custom is to leave between 10% and 15% of the total bill if the service was satisfactory.

19. Where is there a nearby pharmacy or medical center?

- There are chain pharmacies with basic medical offices a few blocks away. (Ask any police officer or public servant for the closest one).

20. Do you have a number for consular or tourist assistance?

- Through the Xoli chatbot, you can access assistance tools. You can also dial Locatel (*0311) to receive general guidance in the city.

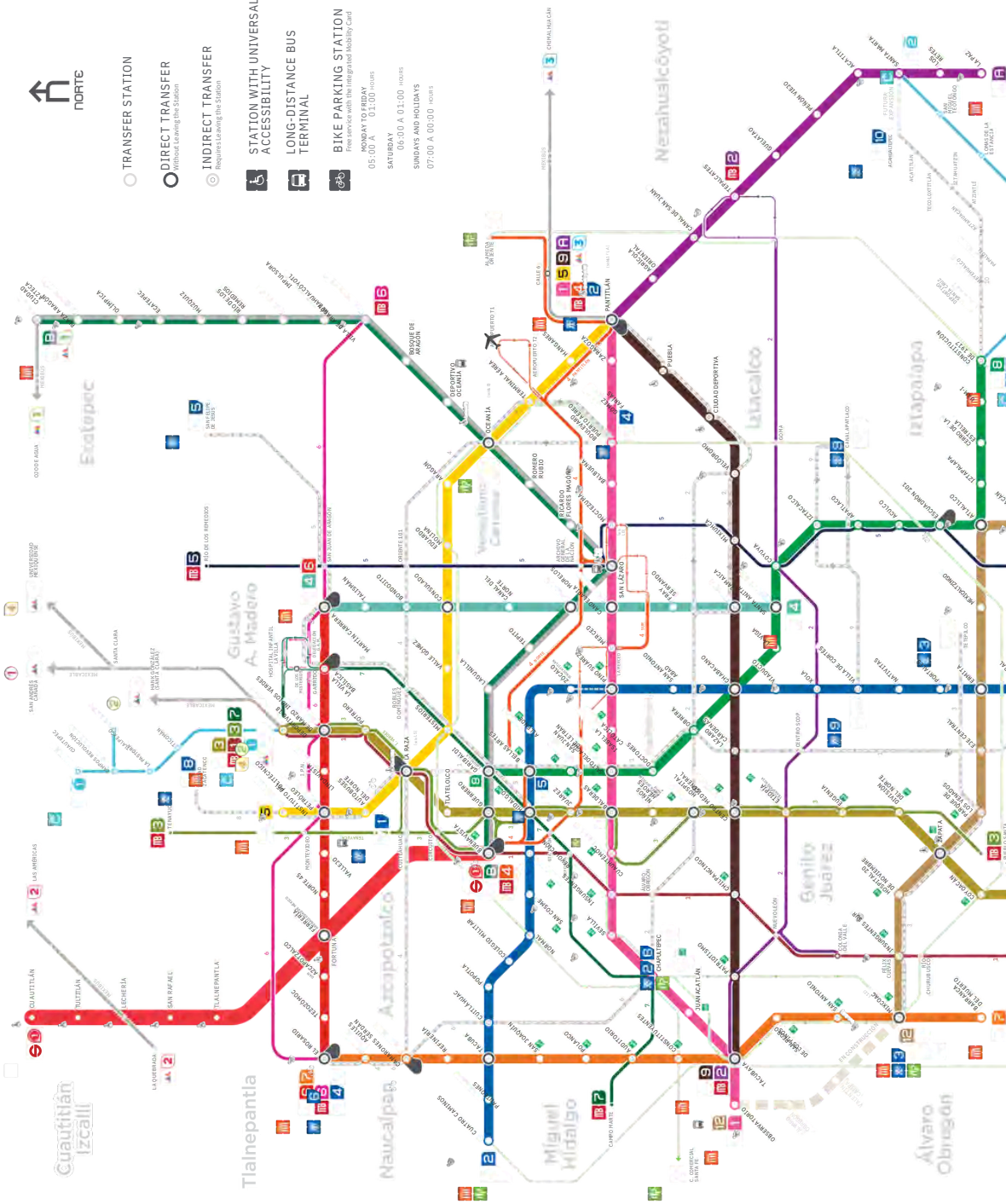

WHAT TO DO IN CASE OF AN EMERGENCY

If you have an emergency in Mexico City, it is essential to know who to contact for quick and effective help. The city has a well-established response system to protect its residents and visitors.

The main number for any type of emergency is:

911 This service centralizes calls for:



Police

If you need police assistance, to report a crime, or a dangerous situation.



Ambulance

For medical emergencies, accidents, or any situation requiring urgent medical attention



Fire Department

In case of fires, gas leaks, or rescues



Civil Protection

For natural disasters, evacuations, or civil risk situations

911 is a toll-free number and operates 24/7. When calling, try to remain calm and provide the clearest and most concise information possible about your location and the nature of the emergency. Also, keep these other numbers handy:

- **Locatel (55 56 58 11 11):** This service is a helpline for locating people, receiving psychological support, or obtaining general information about services in the city. **It's not for direct emergencies**, but it's a great source of information.
- **Policía Turística:** If you are a visitor and need specific assistance related to your stay or if you feel vulnerable as a tourist, contact the Tourist Police. maps.google.com/?q=Policia+Turistica+CDMX
- **Violencia de género y dar asesoría jurídica y psicológica:** The Mexican Women's Ministry offers **079 - option 1**, for guidance in Spanish and English. This service was designed to assist women in reporting any emergency involving violence.
